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Demographic Profile

The population in the Cloverdale city, CA was 8,854 per American Community Survey data for 2016-2020.

The region has a civilian labor force of 4,578 with a participation rate of 63.4%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in the Cloverdale city, CA, 23.4% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 34.3% in the nation.

The median household income in the Cloverdale city, CA is \$80,896 and the median house value is \$493,500.



Employment Trends

As of 2022Q3, total employment for the Cloverdale city, CA was 2,631 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2022Q3, employment increased 2.6% in the region.




Employment for Cloverdale city, CA

Wage Trends

The average worker in the Cloverdale city, CA earned annual wages of \$67,716 as of 2022Q3. Average annual wages per worker increased 2.1% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$68,132 in the nation as of 2022Q3.



Annual average wages per worker data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2022Q2 with preliminary estimates updated to 2022Q3.



Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 62.8% higher in Cloverdale city, CA than the U.S. average.



Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in the Cloverdale city, CA is Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting, employing 497 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Manufacturing (353 workers) and Health Care and Social Assistance (297). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting (LQ = 14.12), Construction (1.73), and Manufacturing (1.66).



Total Workers for Cloverdale city, CA by Industry

Employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2022Q2 with preliminary estimates updated to 2022Q3.

Sectors in the Cloverdale city, CA with the highest average wages per worker are Finance and Insurance (\$115,693), Manufacturing (\$100,131), and Public Administration (\$92,447). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 5 years are Manufacturing (+118 jobs), Construction (+111), and Retail Trade (+27).

Over the next 5 years, employment in the Cloverdale city, CA is projected to expand by 27 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Information with a +2.7% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting (+24 jobs), Accommodation and Food Services (+13), and Health Care and Social Assistance (+10).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in the Cloverdale city, CA is Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations, employing 351 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (277 workers) and Sales and Related Occupations (224). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations (LQ = 20.79), Construction and Extraction Occupations (1.53), and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (1.33).

Occupation groups in the Cloverdale city, CA with the highest average wages per worker are Legal Occupations (\$138,500), Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations (\$129,100), and Management Occupations (\$128,600). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from 0.5% among Business and Financial Operations Occupations to 2.0% among Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations.

Over the next 5 years, the fastest growing occupation group in the Cloverdale city, CA is expected to be Personal Care and Service Occupations with a +1.4% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations (+20 jobs) and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (+11). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations (293 jobs) and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (263).


Occupation employment data are estimated via industry employment data and the estimated industry/occupation mix. Industry employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and currently updated through 2022Q2, imputed where necessary with preliminary estimates updated to 2022Q3. Wages by occupation are as of 2022 provided by the BLS and imputed where necessary. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth

patterns.



Industry Clusters

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. The industry cluster in the Cloverdale city, CA with the highest relative concentration is Agricultural with a location quotient of 13.52. This cluster employs 498 workers in the region with an average wage of \$49,991. Employment in the Agricultural cluster is projected to expand in the region about 0.9% per year over the next ten years.




Industry Clusters for Cloverdale city, CA as of 2022Q3

Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in the Cloverdale city, CA is projected to grow 0.2% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to grow 0.3% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to grow 0.1% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to grow 0.1% per year.

Employment by occupation data are estimates are as of 2022Q3. Education levels of occupations are based on BLS assignments. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.

What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the "all industry" level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the "sector," which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
